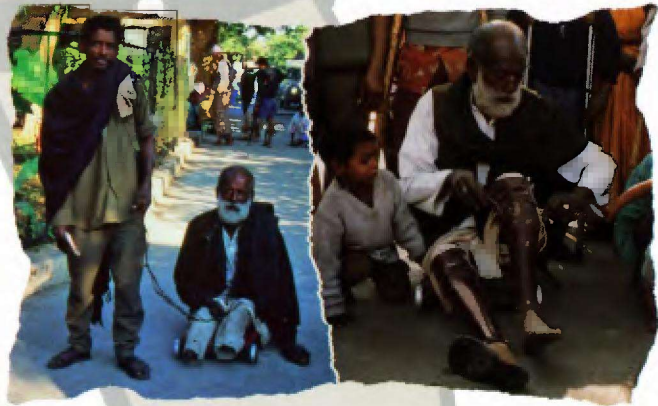

So many people suffering

In many developing countries there are thousands of people that suffer considerable difficulties because of amputated or deformed limbs as a result of accidents, war, diseases like leprosy and polio, or simply due to neglect.

A burden on the family

With severe limitations on what they can do they soon become a burden on their family and their already meagre resources.



There is Hope

The Rotary Jaipur Limb Project, working with specialist organisations like the Mahaveer Society, and with Rotary Clubs, Districts and the Rotary Foundation, sponsor limb camps and permanent centres in many parts of the world

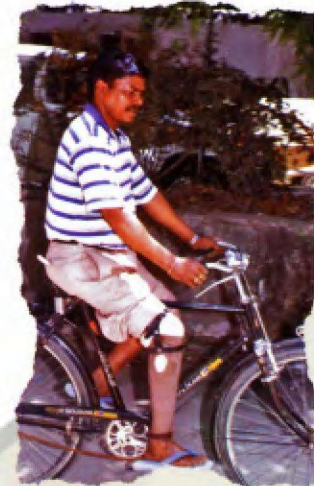


Limbs and callipers fitted free

At these camps and centres, artificial limbs and other aids, are fitted and maintained, at no cost to the patient, enabling them to walk and work again, a family restored to normality.

Strong, flexible, realistic and low cost

The artificial limb must allow the wearer to walk over rough ground and wade through water, to squat and sit cross-legged. It must be comfortable to wear and look good.



Working in many different countries

Since 1990, RJLP have sponsored limb camps and have established permanent centres in India and many other needy countries, including Sri Lanka, Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Malawi, Nigeria, Honduras, Panama, Rwanda and Zimbabwe. New projects are planned and include permanent centres in Ethiopia, Nepal and Zambia.

A huge challenge

It is estimated, that in the developing world, one in every thousand of the population has lost a limb. One million amputees in India alone!



A huge success

The Jaipur Limb, so called because it was developed at the Mahaveer Society Hospital in Jaipur by Dr. Pramod Sethi, winner of the Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace in 2001, can be made by trained local technicians from readily available materials, at a relatively low cost.

The cost

The average cost of a new limb is £25

A Rotary club sponsored limb camp in India for 500 patients will cost about £15,000

A Rotary sponsored permanent limb centre within an existing Orthopaedic unit, including sufficient material for 500 limbs, will cost about £20,000
